

Student Spotlight

Meet **Joe Thompson**, a junior Psychology major who works in two psychology laboratories, including Dr. David Penn's Penn Lab and Dr.

Keely Muscatell's Social Neuroscience and Health Lab.

What encouraged you to get involved in research? The trauma I experienced coming home from combat in Afghanistan led to me having a significant mental health crisis. I was diagnosed with Schizoaffective disorder and forced to face all of the negative stigma and lack of positive stories around the condition. I hope to use my story



What made you choose to work with these labs? I have been working for graduate student Carrington Merrit since I was admitted to UNC last semester. She was the lab manager for the Penn Lab, so I emailed to see if I could do research around the effectiveness of horticulture therapy in the treatment of Schizophrenia. I found out that I probably wouldn't be able to do that until I become a more mature researcher, but she gave me an interview to work with her in the Social Neuroscience and Health Lab. I got the position, and haven't looked back since.

What do you like most? I have been doing recruitment with the Penn Lab for a walking group study for people with conditions similar to my own (Schizophrenia spectrum). Sitting and talking with these individuals about our shared experience has been a true pleasure. They inspire me and remind me why I am out here trying to make a difference.



Meet a Gil Intern



Meet Zigian (Clara) Xu, one of our Spring 2020 interns with the Karen M. Gil Internship Program in Psychology and Neuroscience. Clara is a junior double-majoring in Psychology and Computer Science and minoring in Statistics. This Spring, Clara is interning at UNC's Center of Excellence for Eating Disorders (CEED). Her goal for this internship Is to explore how computational and statistical approaches can be used to better capture human behaviors. Her mentors are Dr. Jessica Baker and Dr. Laura Thornton. Clara says, "Working with these two wonderful mentors, I am currently learning about different psychometric scales used to collect information about eating disorders and other covariates of eating disorders." She compiled data dictionaries at the CEED which describe both psychometric data and biological data collected from a longitudinal study. The data as well as the dictionaries will be added into a data repository

which will be accessible to more researchers.

With her Gil Internship, Clara was also able to start her own independent research project at CEED about the interaction effect of childhood traumatic experience and reward sensitivity on eating disorder symptoms. She's using SAS, a statistical analysis software, to recode data, score data, detect outliers, and construct linear models to fit the data. She shares, "What I am doing might not be the most sophisticated quantitative work, but I am familiarizing myself with countless unexpected statistical subtleties which researchers could encounter every day."
